The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or orders made on them respectively, as follows):—

The Requirement Book was produced and Orders made for Boots and Stockings for the boarded-out child Geely McKenny, and for 7 lbs iron rivets and 2 lbs heel spurs.

Acknowledgments were received from Messrs John & Redmond and Philip O'Doherty M.P.s, of the Resolutions urging the prohibition of the export of potatoes and oats.

Read letter from the Royal Commission on Sugar Supply Scotland House, Victoria Embankment, S.W., stating with regard to the Guardians' Resolution of 6th inst. re shortage of sugar that the only way in which supplies can be obtained is through the sources used by the Guardians in 1915. If anyone declines to act in accordance with the new arrangements the correspondence should be submitted to the Sugar Commission.

Read circular letter from the L. Govt Board, dated 25th Nov 1916 (No 56314: 1916 Waterford Union) drawing attention to the procedure laid down by the Sugar Commission for the distribution of whatever sugar may be available.

Read letter from the L. Govt Board dated 23rd Nov., 1916 No 54987, stating they will raise no objections to the proposal to substitute a half ounce of sugar for a half ounce of treacle in the workhouse children's dietary for afternoon lunch.

Read letter from the L. Govt. Board dated 20th November, 1916, No 54906 inquiring the cause of absence of the boarded-out child Geely McKenny from school since vacation— Referred to Mr. McCloskey, R.O., for inquiry.

On the motion of Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. McTear, it was resolved to charge Patrick Decker Magheranah, an Infirmary patient, at the rate of 4/6 per week ~~whilst~~ for maintenance while in the workhouse.

Mr. Robert Wilson, contractor for sweetmilk to the workhouse, attended the meeting and appealed to the Guardians to request the Local Government Board to reconsider the Guardian's proposal to increase the contract price of sweetmilk by $1\frac{1}{2}^d$ per gallon till 1st May 1917.

Resolved Unanimously that the Local Govt Board be respectfully requested ~~to~~ to re-consider the matter and withdraw their opposition to the very moderate increase proposed. The Guardians present who are all practical men consider that the contractor in equity is entitled to the increase as he was not able to foresee the long continuance of the high and still increasing prices and the very abnormal conditions affecting all matters connected with milk production. The proposed increase from 9^d to $10\frac{1}{2}^d$ per gallon would still leave a clear gain to the rate of $1\frac{1}{2}^d$ per gallon compared with the price in the only other tender received at the time. The Guardians believe that ~~by adopting~~ ^{the adoption of} a too stringent attitude now will have a bad effect on prices in future tenders and will work out to the detriment of the rate payers for many years.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:—

The Master reported that he had lodged to the credit of the Union £9 = 6 = 5 received in repayment of relief & produced Treasurer's receipt. That he had procured for use in Infirmary 1 bottle brandy. He also procured from David Johnson 3 Sacks & 3 1/2 Stones potatoes @ 17/- per sack, and from James Gibbons 13 loads fenders @ 1/- per load. That John McFlyskay made ambulance drives, made 5 journeys for patients between 1st Oct & 9th Nov, and 4 journeys between 23rd Nov & 6th Dec @ contract rate - 15/6. That Northey Caldwell had been paid 12/6 for repairs to sick ambulance. That Edward Lynch, carpenter, was employed 2 1/2 days putting new floors in piggeries & had glazed 25 panes, according to contract. That James Keely, mason, was employed 1 1/2 days repairing lodge chimney & replacing slates after recent storm @ 5/- per day and his labourer @ 2/6 per day. The labourer asks 3/- per day, if employed, in the future.

Approved.

Ordered that Tenders for a quantity of rags on hand, be invited for 18th inst., that the usual extras be allowed the inmates at Christmas, New Year's Day; viz., for Christmas Day - 1/4 oz Tea & 1 oz Sugar each & 2 doz fruit loaves for supper, 1 lb meat each for dinner, also 1 oz tobacco or 1/2 oz Snuff to those who use same, on New Year's Day - 1/4 oz tea & 1 oz Sugar with same allowance of bread as for breakfast at supper.

That the sum of 15/- received from Mr. Bath Doherty, R.A. Merville, being also pension money of Wm. McFallion who was admitted to Infirmary on 23rd Nov and died on 8th Dec be retained by the Board for McFallion's maintenance & lodged with Treasurer.

The Master, having drawn attention to the scarcity of sugar and the difficulty of procuring supplies asked whether the Board would recommend a reduction in the scale allowances. — Ordered that the matter be left over.
