

Circular letter from the L.G. Board, dated 9th June 1915 regarding assistance for British Born wives and children of interned aliens.

The Clerk stated the question did not affect this Union.

Letter from L.G. Board no 32113, date 12th June 1915 relative to the application of the contractor for the supply of bread and Indian meal to the Workhouse and requesting to be informed of the dates when these contracts were entered into and the dates on which they will expire.

The Clerk stated that these contracts were entered into on the 1st Octo. 1914 and will expire on the 30th Sept 1915.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the Insurance Committee of the County forwarding plan, specification, and estimate in connection with the proposed Tuberculosis Dispensary at the Workhouse for the approval of the Guardians.

The following report was read from the Master "on Monday, 24th ultimo. Reported in my Journal that the Matron and the two Infirmary day Nurses left the institution on Saturday, the 15th May and did not return till the 17th May and I did not know anything about it till they were gone. The Guardians did not cause a copy of my report to be inserted in the minutes and gave me no credit but rather blame for reporting this glaring breach of discipline.

I wish again to appeal to the Guardians to assist me in preserving order and discipline."

The Clerk explained that on the 14th May the nun Matron gave him a letter addressed to the Guardians from the Rev Mother asking for leave of absence, on behalf of the Matron & Nurses, from Saturday till Monday as they were obliged to attend some community service at Loughkenny, and a nurse properly qualified would attend to the Sisters' duty in the infirmary, and the Schoolmistress would discharge the Matron's duties.

The Clerk stated that he told the Matron that he thought, under the circumstances, the Guardians would raise no objection to their going away when their duties were being attended to.

The Clerk pointed out that there was no meeting of the Guardians on the 15th May to consider this application from the Rev Mother and as the Sisters and Matron had returned on Saturday he did not think it necessary to take any further action in the matter.

The Guardians approved of what the Clerk had done and asked the Master to furnish particulars of the breaches of discipline which ~~to~~ are being violated.

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given him to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or, orders made on them respectively), as follows:—

Letter no 29.289, date 18th June 1915, relative to the action of the Workhouse Master in depriving an inmate named Mary McGuidy of portion of her rations as a punishment for insubordination, and drawing attention to articles 40, 41, 44, 45, 54 & 56 of the Workhouse Rules, a copy of which is enclosed, and stating that the Master would appear to have exceeded his powers in the case referred to.

The Board at the same time point out that if a visiting committee went through the W. house each week, in pursuance of article 54, any complaints of this nature could have been investigated and reported to the Guardians.

The copy of the Workhouse Rules, which accompanied the foregoing letter, was referred to the Master for his future guidance and the Guardians directed him to comply with them.

Dr Kerrigan applied for his annual vacation of 4 weeks and nominated Dr Johnston to do his duties during his absence.

A similar application was received from Dr Johnston who nominated Dr Kerrigan as his substitute.

In the motion of Mr O'Gee recorded by Mr O'Gee it was resolved to rescind the resolution, insofar as it relates to the Killygordou & Manorla. Dispensary Districts, of locum tenens residing in these districts during the absence on leave of the medical officers.

Both Dr Kerrigan's and Dr Johnston's leave were then granted upon the usual terms viz £3.3.0 a week for the Dispensaries and £1.1.0 for the workhouse.

Read letter from the Inspectors of Lunatics, Dublin Castle, dated 6th July 1915 forwarding for the information of the Guardians, the following memorandum of inspection of the insane inmates of the workhouse.

The following is a copy of the memorandum.

I saw two men and one woman who are classified as a fur sound mind. They appear to receive proper attention and were found clean and fairly tidy. Good spring beds are provided, and the clothing was clean and in good order. I think, however, that hair mattresses might be supplied instead of straw ticks.

The diet scale is not good, and I would suggest giving butter for breakfast, and at least half a pint of milk with the flour about for supper. At present only a quarter of a pint is allowed. The Guardians approved of the Inspector's suggestion to give butter for breakfast and an increased allowance of milk to 1/2 pint for supper & decided that the doctor's attention be called to this addition of the diet.

Letter from LGB date 8th July 1915, stating that owing to Mr Adrian Robinson, Inspector, having been seconded for service in France his duties will be temporarily discharged by Mr Richard Kelly, a retired Inspector of the Board.

The Guardians expressed their pleasure at Mr Kelly again coming to this Union.

The Schoolmistress applied for leave of absence on Friday and Saturday next granted.

Letter from LGB no 37.536, date 4th July 1915 sanctioning the remuneration of £2.2.0 a week to the clerk of the Union to enable him to have his duties discharged during the period of his absence on leave for three weeks.

Letters from LGB on the subject of assistance to destitute aliens and inquiries at Post Offices as to separate allowances, etc.

The Clerk stated that these matters did not affect this Union.

Read letter from the Catholic Institution for the Deaf & Dumb, Dublin, informing the Guardians that owing to the increase in the expenses and the Education cost of Education &c the amount of pension paid for each child under 18 years of age shall be £20 instead of £15 as heretofore.

Read letter from Dr Gormley stating that his fortnight's sick leave has now expired, but he is not yet fit for hard work and requesting the Guardians to allow him his annual holiday of one month from the 1st of August.

Dr Mathews will act as his substitute during his absence.

The Guardians granted the leave asked for and appointed Dr Mathews as Dr Gormley's substitute for four weeks at £3.3.0 a week.

He was absent from school on the day of my visit. Mary B. McMenamin—aged about 4 years—with Mr B. McMenamin, of Ballyshafey.

This is an excellent home. The child is healthy clean and neat and very well cared for. The maintenance allowance for boarded out children in this Union is very inadequate, being at the rate of 8/- 4 for month.

I trust the Guardians will see their way to increase the amount, at any rate during the period of war.

The Relieving Officer was directed to see that Mrs McMenamin's house is kept in a more satisfactory state as to cleanliness.

The question of increasing the maintenance allowance was adjourned.

Letter from L.G.B. no 40, 332 date 23rd August 15 respecting the alterations proposed to be made in the dietary of the inmates.
