The application of Nurse Rice for a week's leave of absence from 19th inst. was granted and Nurse Sara B. O'Donnell, fever hospital, appointed to discharge the duty at the fee of 25/-, the fever hospital being now empty.

On the motion of Mr. Cole seconded by Mr. J. Farren it was Resolved that the Chairman do not receive the notice.

The Report of Dr. O'Hallaghan, Medical Officer of the Workhouse, dated 8th April 1916, relative to the necessity of segregating the Consumptive patients from the other sick in the Workhouse Infirmary was read.

Dr. Mc Cormack, L. G. Inspector, attended the meeting, and strongly recommended the Guardians to adopt the scheme suggested and add a second storey to each of the Idiot Wards as an extension of the Infirmary, and so save an addition to the Nursing Staff which would be necessary should ~~two~~ wards in the main building be utilised.

Dr. O'Hallaghan also strongly urged immediate action.

On the motion of Mr. Mc Fallion seconded by Mr. Scott it was decided to appoint Mr. W. J. Doherty L. E. to make plans & Specification of the proposed alterations @ 2½% on the estimated cost, and if gone on with, at a total of 5% on the cost.

Mr. Mc Laughlin, Asst. Surveyor, attended the meeting relative to an obstruction in the tail drain from a pipe across the road at the S.E. Corner of the Workhouse premises, said tail drain being supposed to be on the Union property, the obstruction being caused to a great extent by the drain or through being used as a passage for cattle.

The Guardians decided to take no action, as the work is a "County" job. They have no objection to the cleaning of the tail drain.
