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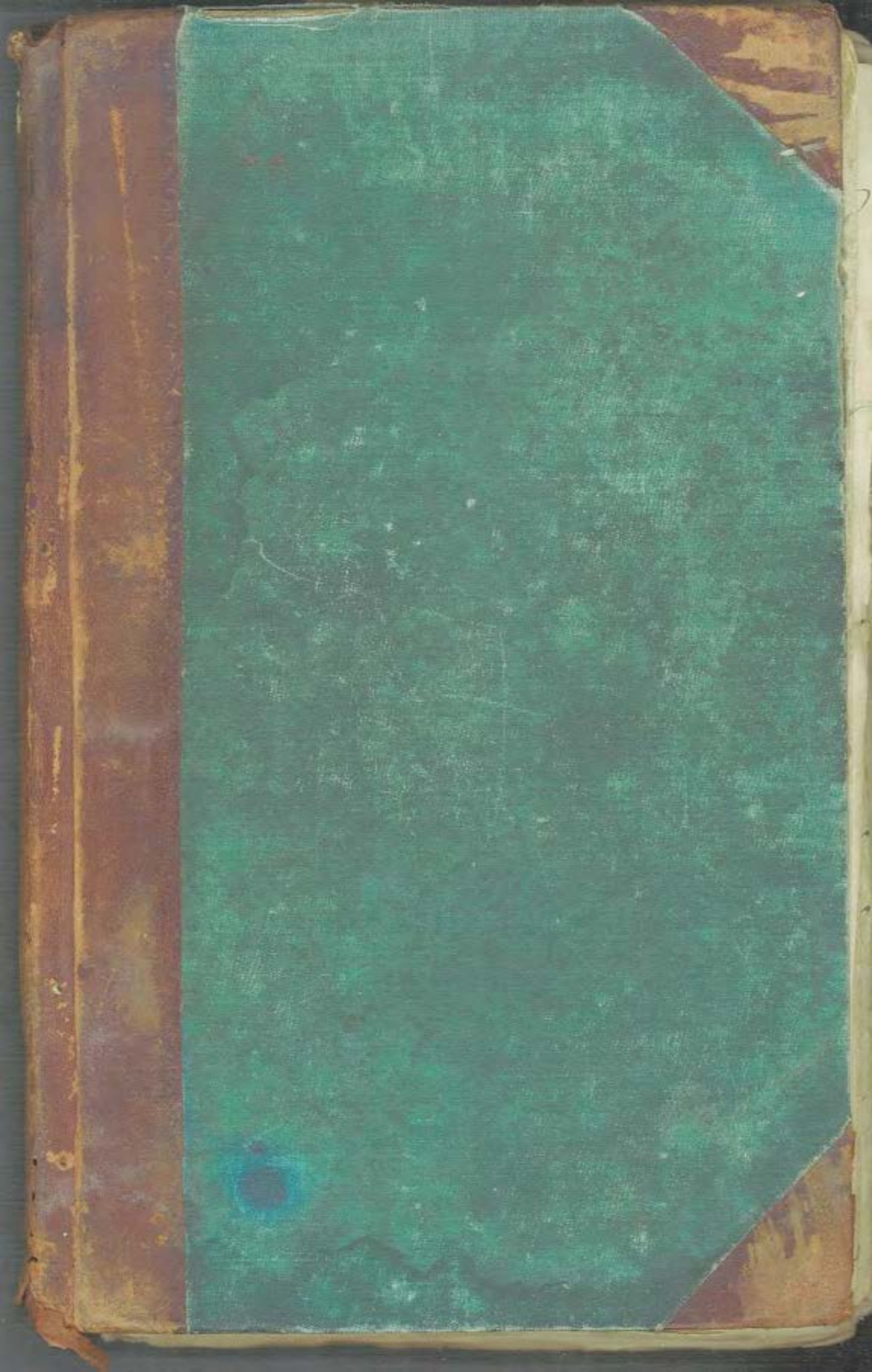

My only safety arose from the divided opinion of the Combatants for had they all fallen the same way, I should most certainly have been dropped out of bed. Now the case is altered, there is a most comfortable accommodation here in a district of Country where the only accommodation a Traveller could get was such as I have described above. An Inn that reflects much credit on the spirit of the Landlord, and proprietor of the Soil for a most extensive Room - as also on the kind and attentive host who takes care of the Inn. I have had only time to stop for Lunch which was served in most comfortable style, but I took occasion to walk through the Country, and must add my tribute of praise to those which may be found in the preceding pages. and four other persons, were travelling from Dublin
to Buncle, when they were benighted, and nearly lost.
There was no Inn then, nor even a Post of any kind
in this direction; the night was dark, their only
guide a Star, and, through forgetting to make allow-
ance for its northing as it declined, they had deviated
from their proper course, (being without Chart or
compass) and had nearly foundered in a Thicket.

What a charming contrast now presents
itself to the view!

Should any of the writers valued friends, whom he leaves behind him, be attracted to this spot after he is gone, and chance to turn to this Page, they may perceive the parting address of one, whose heart will ever be with them, and whose thoughts will often wander back to these delightful wilds; the scenes of his best and happiest days. They, and the writers humble, but kind hearted friends, the poor Peasantry, will be remembered by him with a fond affection as long as he lives. The latter he has ever found kind and respectful, and grateful for any attention shown to them. They are a bright and intelligent people. Patiently bearing the most severe privations, and generous even to a fault. In illustration of which, the writer must grace these pages with the following touching little anecdote:-

A dreadful Famine prevailed here in 1831. Two of the poorer description of the Peasantry came to the writers Cottage, craving a little food, to carry home to their wives and 15 children, none of whom, or themselves, had tasted a morsel for 48 hours. They were requested to take each as much as would suffice for a Supper & Breakfast for their families, but when they saw that the writer had secured a weeks potatoes left, and altho' they knew that no provision of any kind could be obtained, even for money, in any other place, within their reach, with a generous forbearance, they absolutely refused to take one single potatoe, and soon afterwards went away without any saying, "There was little enough for the writer, our family!" Even Sharkey, and Michael Dragon,

13 are their names, both of an age, in Templemore, and they are still living in the same place, in a state of poverty and wretchedness, which the writer will not attempt to describe.

A crowd of other affecting incidents rush to the writers recollection, all claiming a record here, from which he selects the following:-

In the winter of 1832. 3. Toss in the Black Mouth of February. A schooner, with a crew of four men, in the middle of the night, and during a tremendous Gale from the West, was dashed against the Rocks of Innis-Erris, and very soon sunk. One man was lost, the other three were thrown upon the top of a high and perpendicular Rock, within a Stones throw of the Island, (Innis-Erris)

"as black a precipice, as ever"
"Gave mariners a shelter and despairing"
"A spot to make the saved regret the wreck"
"Which late went down, and every the last week..."

in which situation they were discovered when day appeared. Attempts were made to throw them coils of fire, and potatoes, but vain. Their fate seemed sealed. For to attempt to rescue them through such a terrible sea was being between the Rock and the Island, was a fool's hope indeed, and appeared almost impossible.

What was to be done. If the unfortunate men were to spend another night on that horrid Rock it would, doubtless, be their last. In the kindness of human nature as it told, that, six of their fellow Islanders manned three Corroghs, two in each, and, watching a favourable interval between the

waves, gallantly shot across the foam in their little
 boats, and gained a rock on the Rock. here a new
 difficulty opposed itself. high on their heads,
 perched on the Rock. benumbed with cold. wet.
 bruised, and nearly paralyzed, from the combined
 effects of fear and the dreadful sufferings of the
 preceding night. As the poor objects of their
 solicitude. and, the Rock being perfectly perpen-
 dicular at its sides, there was no other way of gaining
 access to the boats but by dropping into them, at the
 imminent risk of either upsetting or straining them.
 one of the ^{three} ~~boats~~ the Saffron. was upwards of 12 tons
 weight. the noble fellows paused but for a moment.
 such hearts are not easily daunted. the attempt
 was made. providentially without an accident occur-
 ring. each burrough received its guest. and the
 gallant fellows succeeded, as if by the intervention
 of a miracle, in landing each his charge in safety

Having left Drompanagh on Wednesday morning at 9 A.M. for the purpose of attending the branch Dispensary Cross Roads and after going over some dozens of patients together with as many squalling children to be vaccinated; we were summoned by a visiting order from the ex-high sheriff of the Co. My connection by Property in the District of Granada
having ceased by the disposal of Demulroy I feel that
the placing before the proprietors of this Hotel a few
additional "facts from Granada" may not be uninteresting
to them. Having purchased Demulroy some years before
Lord G. Will became the Rector of the property in this
neighbourhood I can bear more ample testimony
to the changes that have been wrought and the influence
which led to them than probably any other person
could do and the more so as I believe I was in some
measure instrumental in inducing Lord G. Will
to settle here and have for many years had the
privilege of enjoying his friendship which it is
impossible to estimate too highly.

In the Summer of 1832 his Lordship accompanied me on a Tour round the West and North Coast of Ireland. The result of the tour was the same and the bad management or rather the absence of any management on many Estates first suggested to his Lordship the idea of purchasing a property and working out his own means at training the people to a moral and social scale of civilization. His Lordship eventually succeeded in purchasing the property he now holds and most especially a worse selection in any other estate he could not have made. In encountering the extreme difficulties incident to all properties "more or less" circumstantially he may truly have been said to have "taken the bull by the horns." In order to show the great changes that have been effected I shall briefly state the very first attempt to see Douglas (then L. date) was made on Horseback. Mr James Gately was at Ballyvaughan.

for a look and to where the road then terminated at
Ballou's was then four miles from Duncraig with
nothing but a dangerous Mountain track before me
and at night was coming on I was compelled to
retire and for the time gave up all idea of having
the Purchaser come. Months afterwards I was induced
again to attempt it. Then walked from Bombay
over the Bay and by the side of the River where the
Hotel now stands and by the margin of the Lake
to Duncraig. I subsequently succeeded in getting
the line of Road made from Montreal to Guerdon
and in effecting other slight improvements but
the nature of my official duties precluded the
possibility of doing much to improve the people

required the most constant and watchful care
to check and amend.

Still distillation was another source
of trouble to improvement and the difficulty of checking

of the Ordnance Survey was published I did not
know that a still had been regularly worked
at Dunsloggy within 200 yards of the House.

The changes that have taken place speak for themselves. The Turrets upon his Lordship's estate have all been placed on separate & distinct holdings well fenced and drained their Colleges are clean and comfortable and the people formerly the most lawless have been brought into habits of industry and good order and all this has been effected without harshness or severity his Lordship's property has been improved coupled with the most mild and affable disposal which has worked its way to the hearts of the people and enabled him to overcome difficulties which to most others would have been insurmountable.

The prejudices and pernicious habits of a numerous and unenlightened peasantry, which in other parts of Ireland they would have shed blood to maintain, have here been overcome by a gentle and moral effort.
